HAPPY VALENTINES DAY !


A VERY Happy Valentine's Day to you all for Sunday!

and mine, and in your neighbour's heart and in those of all your family and friends.

So I pray that as I offer these short daily Reflections, the Spirit of God may encourage and stir your heart afresh, reminding us of his great love and of His Great Commission,

SUNDAY READINGS & SERMON

The Bible readings for Sunday are below. Nigel Knights Johnson's sermon is attached, with suggested personal/group questions at the end.

Psalm 50: 1-6

¹ The LORD, the Mighty One, is God, and he has spoken; he has summoned all humanity from where the sun rises to where it sets.

² From Mount Zion, the perfection of beauty, God shines in glorious radiance.

³ Our God approaches, and he is not silent.

Fire devours everything in his way, and a great storm rages around him.

⁴ He calls on the heavens above and earth below to witness the judgment of his people. ⁵ "Bring my faithful people to me— those who made a covenant with me by giving sacrifices." ⁶ Then let the heavens proclaim his justice, for God himself will be the judge.

Exodus 19: 9-19

⁹ Then the LORD said to Moses, "I will come to you in a thick cloud, Moses, so the people themselves can hear me when I speak with you. Then they will always trust you."

Moses told the LORD what the people had said. ¹⁰ Then the LORD told Moses, "Go down and prepare the people for my arrival. Consecrate them today and tomorrow, and have them wash their clothing. ¹¹ Be sure they are ready on the third day, for on that day the LORD will come down on Mount Sinai as all the people watch. ¹² Mark off a boundary all around the mountain. Warn the people, 'Be careful! Do not go up on the mountain or even touch its boundaries. Anyone who touches the mountain will certainly be put to death. ¹³ No hand may touch the person or animal that crosses the boundary; instead, stone them or shoot them with arrows. They must be put to death.'

However, when the ram's horn sounds a long blast, then the people may go up on the mountain.^[a]"

¹⁴ So Moses went down to the people. He consecrated them for worship, and they washed their clothes. ¹⁵ He told them, "Get ready for the third day, and until then abstain from having sexual intercourse."

¹⁶ On the morning of the third day, thunder roared and lightning flashed, and a dense cloud came down on the mountain. There was a long, loud blast from a ram's horn, and all the people trembled. ¹⁷ Moses led them out from the camp to meet with God, and they stood at the foot of the mountain. ¹⁸ All of Mount Sinai was covered

with smoke because the LORD had descended on it in the form of fire. The smoke billowed into the sky like smoke from a brick kiln, and the whole mountain shook violently. ¹⁹ As the blast of the ram's horn grew louder and louder, Moses spoke, and God thundered his reply.

Mark 9: 2-13

² Six days later Jesus took Peter, James, and John, and led them up a high mountain to be alone. As the men watched, Jesus' appearance was transformed, ³ and his clothes became dazzling white, far whiter than any earthly bleach could ever make them. ⁴ Then Elijah and Moses appeared and began talking with Jesus.

⁵ Peter exclaimed, "Rabbi, it's wonderful for us to be here! Let's make three shelters as memorials^[a]—one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." ⁶ He said this because he didn't really know what else to say, for they were all terrified.

⁷ Then a cloud overshadowed them, and a voice from the cloud said, "This is my dearly loved Son. Listen to him." ⁸ Suddenly, when they looked around, Moses and Elijah were gone, and they saw only Jesus with them.

⁹ As they went back down the mountain, he told them not to tell anyone what they had seen until the Son of Man^[b] had risen from the dead. ¹⁰ So they kept it to themselves, but they often asked each other what he meant by "rising from the dead."

¹¹ Then they asked him, "Why do the teachers of religious law insist that Elijah must return before the Messiah comes?^[c]" ¹² Jesus responded, "Elijah is indeed coming first to get everything ready. Yet why do the Scriptures say that the Son of Man must suffer greatly and be treated with utter contempt? ¹³ But I tell you, Elijah has already come, and they chose to abuse him, just as the Scriptures predicted."
